On behalf of the North East Inner City Programme Implementation Board, I would like to welcome you to our 2023 Progress Report.

In May of this year, I was appointed by the Government as the Independent Chairperson of the Programme Implementation Board for the North East Inner City Initiative. I would like to take this opportunity to extend my thanks to my predecessor, Michael Stone, and acknowledge his leadership, drive and commitment to the Initiative since its inception in 2017. The Programme Implementation Board garnered significant achievements under his stewardship and his dedication to the community throughout his time as Independent Chairperson is commendable. I would also like to extend my sincere thanks and well wishes to Michael O'Riordan (recently retired NEIC Programme Manager) who was also devoted to the community and was of immense support to me when I undertook the role of Independent Chair.

My role as Independent Chairperson of the NEIC Programme Implementation Board is to oversee the implementation of the Mulvey Report, Dublin's North East Inner City: Creating a Brighter Future, which was published in February 2017. The report containing recommendations for the social and economic regeneration of Dublin's North East Inner City and was further supplemented by the NEIC Strategic Plan 2020-2023.

At the heart of the NEIC Initiative is the vision to make the North East Inner City a safe, attractive, and vibrant living and working environment for the community and its families with opportunities for all to lead full lives.

Over the coming months, this vision will remain central as we embark on a strategic review of the NEIC Initiative. This review is timely as we come to the end of the current NEIC Strategic Plan 2020-2023 and provides an opportunity to reflect on the work progressed to date, identify current and available opportunities, and to maximise the value of the NEIC Initiative. This work will culminate in a new Strategic Plan for 2024 – 2027.

The Government allocated €7.5 million to the Initiative for 2023 and this has allowed the Programme Implementation Board to continue to implement a range of initiatives and programmes as set out in the Strategic Plan and in the Mulvey Report. Throughout this Progress Report you will find details on the projects, initiatives, and pilot programmes implemented throughout the year across the six NEIC Subgroups. While there are too many to acknowledge here, I would like to make reference to some of those achievements.

2023 was without doubt an important year for capital investments and redevelopments in the area. Key among these was Diamond Park, Rutland Street School, and the former Magdalene Laundry site.

In August, Diamond Park reopened following an extensive redevelopment. True to its name, the newly renovated park has become a real jewel in the North East Inner City. It is heartening to see this incredible amenity become a place of pride for the community and we hope to continue to see families enjoying the park for generations to come.

The refurbishment of the former Rutland Street School has been a long-standing aspiration of the Programme Implementation Board and a key objective of the Mulvey Report. I was delighted to participate at the 'turning-of-the-sod' event in November and I commend Dublin City Council and all the stakeholders who had the drive and commitment to bringing the project to this significant milestone. This landmark building will soon be re-established as a focal point for the community, safeguarding its use and prosperity for future generations of Dubs.

Alongside the new Diamond Park and the Rutland Street School project, work is advanced to establish a National Centre for Research and Remembrance on the site of former Magdalene Laundry on Sean McDermott Street. This work reaffirms the commitment of the Government and the Programme Implementation Board to deliver on its promises to the community, and when completed, it will contribute to the positive transformation of the area. I look forward to seeing the progress on the National Centre for Research and Remembrance continue at pace in 2024.

The long-anticipated reopening of the Sean McDermott Street Swimming Pool took place in July after extensive renovations and refurbishments, including retiling damaged areas of the pool, and repairs to the roof. We want to see Dublin's North Inner City swimming again, and recognising the impact different disciplines of aquatics has on people and its communities, Swim Ireland has partnered Dublin City Council to bring this exciting and new project to the community.

Our Sports and Wellbeing programme continues to build on existing successful initiatives and activities, and in response to demand, the Programme Implementation Board is supporting new initiatives including weightlifting, walking football, and activities for people residing in homeless hubs in the area. This year we also held the inaugural SwellFest in the historic Mountjoy Square to celebrate sports and wellness, and promote diversity, inclusion, and connection in the community.

Once again, the Programme Implementation Board were delighted to fund numerous cultural events throughout 2023 including the Chinese Lunar New Year, Intercultural Family Fun Day, Culture Night events, and the annual Big Scream Halloween Festival.

The Greening Strategy has remained an ongoing focus for the Programme Implementation Board. By investing and improving the physical landscape that communities live in, we aim to support community pride in this unique part of Dublin. The Programme Implementation Board also believes that 'small stuff matters' and we are proactively engaged with the Dublin City Council and their dedicated waste management unit to help the NEIC community keep their streets clean. Both of these works will continue at pace in 2024.

I would like to take this opportunity to reaffirm the Programme Implementation Board's steadfast commitment to improving educational opportunities for all in the North East Inner City. Having visited many primary and secondary schools in the area I would like to take this opportunity to commend the outstanding and ongoing commitment by the teachers to the community. I was also heartened to learn during my meeting with the network of NEIC school principals that educational initiatives, such as Pathways to Technology (P-TECH), are having a meaningful and positive impact, with exciting new plans in development for Further Education and Higher Education options.

The 2023 report illustrates the innovative and vital work that has been completed across the six subgroups throughout the year. The Programme Implementation Board is committed to capitalising on these achievements throughout 2024 and focus on achieving the goals and actions that will be outlined in the updated Strategic Plan. Whatever challenges come our way, I am confident in our ability to overcome them and capitalise on the vast expanse of opportunities that lie ahead.

I want to acknowledge my colleagues on the Programme Implementation Board and thank them for their support as I adapted to my new role as Independent Chairperson. I also commend their unwavering enthusiasm, energy and commitment to the NEIC Initiative.

Finally, I would like to express my gratitude to the Government for the priority and support they continued to afford this Initiative in 2023.

It is no secret that working collaboratively is essential to the ongoing success of the Initiative. The Programme Implementation Board is steadfast in its commitment to make the North East Inner City of Dublin a safe, attractive and vibrant living and working environment for the community and its families with opportunities for all to lead full lives.

In 2024, I look forward to continued close cooperation with the community, businesses, Dublin City Council, Government departments and agencies as we strive, collectively, towards the unanimous goal of Creating a Brighter Future for all in the North East Inner City.

The Board meets every month and is comprised of the key Government departments and agencies that have statutory responsibility for delivery of services, alongside community and business representatives. The Board is assisted in its work by six subgroups composed of Departments, Government agencies and community representatives.



Enhancing Policing

Chair: Chief Superintendent Patrick McMenamin, An Garda Síochána.

This Subgroup works to reduce crime in the community; alleviate gangland threat in the community, build community confidence in the Gardaí; and refurbish and reopen Fitzgibbon Street Garda Station.

Maximising Educational, Training and Employment Opportunities Chair: Brenda Boylan, Department of the Taoiseach

Transforming the Physical Environment

In 2017, the Mulvey Report identified the North East Inner City as "an area of significant place assets but one of significant contrasts." He noted that "alongside state-of-the art architectural showpieces we have unsightly housing, derelict buildings, waste / litter and unsightly building facades."

Since 2017, the North East Inner City has been transforming to meet the needs of its residents and communities. This is being achieved through investment by the Government, the Programme Implementation Board, Dublin City Council, and all stakeholders and their unwavering commitment to the Initiative.

Following on from the hugely successful landmark projects already underway and completed, including the NEIC Greening Strategy, the Royal Canal Cycleway, and Fitzgibbon Street Garda Station, the Programme Implementation Board is proud to have helped drive progress on the initiatives below which are physical manifestations of the commitment to deliver on promises made to this community.

Rutland Street School

The 10th of November 2023 was a landmark day in the North East Inner City with a sod-turning event to mark the commencement of refurbishment works at the former Rutland Street School. The NEIC Programme Implementation Board are delighted to contribute funding towards the redevelopment of this iconic building which is identified as a priority project in the Mulvey Report.

On completion, the building will provide modern, state of the art facilities for youth, community, cultural and education services; deliver a new Civic Centre for the wider North Inner City area; and provide business incubation spaces and shared office space on site to encourage entrepreneurship / small business development in the area. Diamond Park


Alongside the community, a vision for the redevelopment of Diamond Park was created, and in August 2023 that vision came to fruition. Work began in July of 2022 to fully redevelop Diamond Park and following 12 months of extensive work, the Park was officially reopened by the Lord Mayor of Dublin Daithí de Roíste and Minister Paschal Donohoe on 14th of August 2023. This beautiful new facility and community space for all in the North East Inner City features new fun playground facilities, open green spaces, shrubs & trees, and new seating areas.



James Joyce Street Park

Building on the refurbishment of the St Mary's Mansions in 2020, work began in March to redevelop the underutilised open space of James Joyce Street Park in front of the complex. As part of the NEIC Greening Strategy, and following consultation with the residents' association and Clúid Housing, boasts additional new trees, shrubs, plants, outdoor seating, and an outdoor boules lawn which is proving a hit with local community groups.







National Centre for Research and Remembrance

The former Magdalene Laundry site on Seán McDermott Street was identified in the Mulvey Report as a keynote site which had potential as a large scale infrastructural project for the area. In July 2023, the Government approved a masterplan for the National Centre for Research and Remembrance located on the site.

The National Centre will stand as a site of conscience to honour equally all those who were a resident in Industrial Schools, Magdalene Laundries, Mother and Baby and County Home Institutions, Reformatories, and related institutions.

It will also make a valuable contribution to the social and economic development of Dublin's North East Inner City, through the provision of social housing units, further and higher educational facilities, and facilities for family and parenting supports.

To ensure the project is informed by all relevant stakeholders, an open consultation ran from 25th July to 15th September 2023, with a view to informing work on elements of the National Centre project. Further targeted consultations on specific elements of the Centre will take place in due course.

Sean McDermott Street Swimming Pool

Following extensive works to repair the roof, ceiling and broken tiles in the Sean McDermott Street Swimming Pool, this important community facility reopened on the 11th of July. The pool also underwent a facelift with a new façade bringing a fresh look to the building. Swim Ireland took over the management of the pool in November and a full timetable is in operation including school bookings, public swims, and swimming lessons.











Charleville Mall Library

Charleville Mall Library is a rich resource to the residents and schools in the community. However, built in the early 20th century, the building was in need of an upgrade internally. In conjunction with Dublin City Council, the Programme Implementation Board contributed towards a programme of works to bring the library up to current standards, including the addition of fully accessible toilets, automated entrance doors, and a fresh internal design.

These works have ensured that the library is a better space for all as well as being more accessible for all residents in the community.



Community Safety & Engagement

Garda Operations

Throughout 2023 high visibility and high impact patrols were a regular feature of policing in the NEIC area as part of Operation Cribbage, Operation Canter, and Divisional Drugs Unit operations. These operations continue to target anti-social behaviour and drug dealing criminality in the area and have led to seizures of cash associated with criminal activity, as well as seizures of significant quantities of drugs in the North East Inner City. Collaboration with Dublin City Council and their work in residential areas have assisted An Garda Síochána in the effective policing of anti-social behaviour black spots

Law Enforcement Assisted Recovery (LEAR) Project


Supported by the NEIC Initiative, throughout 2023, An Garda Síochána, Dublin City Council, and the HSE continued to work with the Ana Liffey Drug Project to provide the LEAR (Law Engagement and Assisted Recovery) project service in the North East Inner City. This free and confidential service, offers case management, addiction supports, referrals and many other types of practical supports to people who need their assistance. Over the past 12 months the team engaged and provided support such as case management, needle exchange or signposting to people involved with substance use, antisocial behaviour, criminal behaviour and/or rough sleeping within the NEIC area.

Drug Related Intimidation

Drug related intimidation, as well as intimidation in a in 2023 for the NEIC's Enhanced Policing Subgroup. The importance of community leadership is imperative for the reconciliation of this ongoing matter. Additionally, the need for community and all other organisations, including our public representatives, to work with An Garda Síochána cannot be understated.

Community Safety Local Partnership, the NEIC and An Garda Síochána will continue to work collaboratively along with all partners to achieve our mutual aims throughout 2024 and beyond.



Local Community Safety Partnership

The Community Safety Partnership was established in 2020 as one of three pilots ahead of the national rollout of the new community safety policy in 2024. This policy recognises that building stronger, safer communities is a multi-agency responsibility.

In September, the Dublin North Inner City Local Community Safety Plan was launched under the Chair of Eddie Mullins. The North Inner City Plan outlines 50 actions across the priority areas of:

- 1. Drugs, Inclusion-Health, Anti-Social Behaviour
- 2. Family, Youth and Community
- 3. Education, Life-Long Learning
- 4. Integration, Ethnic and Multi Faith Inclusion
- 5. Physical Environment.

Bridge Project

The Bridge Project was established in early 2022 as a response to target conflict occurring between youths from both north and south of the Liffey at the Sean O'Casey Bridge. A multi-agency response involving An Garda Síochána, DCC, Youth Services, the Local Community Safety Partnership, and school representation, has aided the success of the Bridge Project in addressing the root causes of these conflicts.

This strong collaborative group meets regularly and organises activities to engage the young people from the Bridge Project. In June, a football match took place between the Gardaí and the young people. A great day was had by all and the young people have looked for a rematch. Further events planned as part of the Bridge Project include, a follow-up football match in December, a programme with Frontline Bikes, and planning is underway to set up an off-shore rowing club to get the young people from the Bridge Project involved.

Dialogue Process

Since 2018, the NEIC Initiative have supported a dialogue process between Gardaí, youth services and young people from the area in order to build better relationships and trust. This also enables both Gardaí and young people to have a better understanding of each other and their roles within the community. As part of the process in 2023 and facilitated by the Community Action Network, dialogue took place in Store Street Garda Station where youth leaders had open discussions with Community Gardaí. The youth leaders were also given a tour of Store Street Garda station so they could understand the work that goes on in the background in a Garda Station.

Dublin North Central Garda Youth Awards Ceremony

The Dublin North Central Garda Youth Awards Ceremony was held in Croke Park on the 7th of July. This event recognised the outstanding achievements of young people in our community between the ages of 13 and 21 years.



Juvenile Liaison and Community Youth Workers

Across the Dublin North Central Division, An Garda Síochána continued to support and engage in restorative practice dialogue with youth groups and students from local schools and attended the launch of the Restorative Practice Strategy at Belvedere Youth Club.

Gardaí Participation at Local Events

Gardaí from Store Street and Fitzgibbon Street attended and participated in many local events throughout the year including the Lunar New Year, Swellfest and the Big Scream Festival. An Garda Síochána's Community Policing team along with other units had a great year working with youth groups, senior citizen groups, residents and businesses.

Schools & Students

City Connects

The City Connects programme, operating in 10 NEIC primary schools, works to provide each and every student the supports they need in order to succeed and thrive in school and achieve their full potential. City Connects Coordinators, based in schools, review the strengths and needs of every student across the areas of - Academics, Social/Emotional/Behavioural, Family, and Health - and then links each child to a tailored set of supports and enrichment opportunities, to build on their strengths and address any needs they may have.

North East Inner City Multi-Disciplinary Team (MDT)

The NEIC MDT is an interagency collaboration between Health Service Executive Primary Care and the Department of Education National Educational Psychological Service.

The MDT delivers a high quality, child centred, school-based service across Psychology, Occupational Therapy, and Speech and Language Therapy in 10 Dublin inner city primary schools. It responds to the needs of children, their families, and their schools through targeted training, advice, prevention work, assessment, and therapeutic interventions.

Since its inception in 2020, the MDT has made a positive impact on the many children, families, and teachers that it supports.

Over the past 3 years, 2020-23 the MDT have had:

consultations held with key stakeholders (parents, school staff, other professionals)

assessments were completed

delivered

training sessions annually for parents/ school staff across a range of areas including: trauma informed practice, communication skills, emotional regulation, fine motor skills.



Larkin Community College Music Library

Earlier this year, the NEIC Initiative provided funding to purchase equipment for Larkin Community College Music Library. The music instrument library ensures all students have the opportunity to explore an interest in learning a musical instrument. The keyboards, guitars, bass guitars and assorted musical equipment has proven very popular. It also provides students with the chance to borrow the instruments and practice at home outside of school hours.

Doodle Den

The NEIC Initiative provided funding to ensure three local schools could deliver the after-school literacy programme, Doodle Den. The programme is targeted at children in Senior Infants and focuses on improving children's literacy through a wide range of activities such as games, phonics, art, drama, independent and shared reading and physical activity.

Further funding has been approved by the NEIC Initiative to enable four local schools to deliver the programme over the 2023/24 school year.

In June, a Doodle Den graduation ceremony took place in the National College of Ireland where each child was presented with a certificate of completion.





Quality Circle Time

In 2023, the NEIC Initiative funded Quality Circle Time supports for a number of primary schools in the area. Quality Circle Time has proven successful in promoting better relationships and helping with positive behaviour. The key aims are

Promoting positive behaviour management.

Promoting better relationships between pupils and teachers.

Improvements in student learning.

A more harmonious running of the school.

Fighting Words

Fighting Words facilitated a wide range of creative projects with young people in the North East Inner City area this year, utilising the creative practices of writing and storytelling to empower children and teenagers. The project worked collaboratively with organisations such as St Brigid's Day Nursery and Belvedere Youth Club and with initiatives such as afterschool Word Warrior writing club for 8-12 year-olds and school workshop programmes. Participants greatly impressed everyone with their endless imaginations.

Afterschool Study Programme

The NEIC Initiative continues to support after school study programme for all 6 post primary schools in the NEIC. This programme aims to boost the academic performance and provide a safe, structured and supportive environment for students to complete class-based assignments, engage in research for project work and prepare for exams. The programme also facilitates additional workshops to develop study skills and the wellbeing of students.



Fire Station Artists' Studios (FSAS) Film Club

The FSAS Film Club workshop series is a wonderful opportunity for children and young people to learn about filming techniques and discover how to use professional filming equipment. In 2022/3, the first Film Club, in conjunction with City Connects, resulted movie was then screened in the Light House Cinema, and in the LAB as part of Cruinniú na nÓg.

The 2023/2024 Film Club has expanded its partnership to include Belvedere Youth Club, broadening the reach of the programme to more young people. Participants are currently working on making a documentary about their football experience which will be screened in the cinema in the new year.

Business Engagement with Students

Pathways to Technology (P-TECH)

P-TECH operates across five post-primary schools in the North East Inner City, with multiple partners supporting the programme. It is an education initiative that combines post primary education with elements of further education and workplace experience. It involves a three-way partnership between school, higher/further education institution(s), and industry partners. It includes a structured workplace learning strand with mentoring, worksite visits, speakers, and project days.

Work experience has the potential to make a real difference in the lives

of young people. The NEIC Work Experience Placement Programme is one strand in a coordinated effort to open doors, raise awareness and aspirations and ultimately to provide students in NEIC schools with access to and insight into professions and career paths outside their existing network.

Career Coffee Mornings 2023-2024

The Career Coffee Mornings Initiative provide students with the chance to visit corporate organisations. The format allows students to hear new perspectives, engage with different staff members and learn about their different roles.

As part of the programme, participating organisations provide the students with

- » A tour of their office space;
- » A short day in the life of 2-3 different employees in the office;
- » At least one workshop (introduction to coding, presentation skills, cv& interviews skills etc);
- » Q & A session;
- » Breakfast for the students.

Impact of the participation in the Work Experience Placement Programme

100% of students were glad they participated in the programme.

100% were happy and felt welcomed on their placement.

90% would recommend the experience to future TY students.

75% said the work experience has influenced their decisions on school subjects, going to college or what they would like to work as.

60% of students shared that they discovered new careers they had not known of before

74% stated that the experience changed their thoughts about what it is like to work or start a career

100% of students reported benefitting from the Flash Mentoring Programme.

TY Coordinators found Career Coffee Mornings to be high impact in influencing students confidence and raising aspirations with the class.

100% of school have expressed interest in engaging in all 3 programmes next year.

Flash Mentoring

In 2023, students from Mount Carmel, Larkin Community College, St Joseph's Fairview and Marino College all participated in a 4 - 6 week Flash Mentoring Programme. Participating in the programme, 120 Transition Year students across the four schools had the opportunity to speak with different mentors across a range of different organisations. A total of 25 Flash Mentoring events took place between January - May 2023 during which students engaged with a professional on a one-to-one

During the sessions mentors were encouraged to share their career journey and experience with students. The positive engagement between the students and mentors saw several of the mentors going above and beyond by volunteering for more sessions and offering their emails and further assistance to both the students and the schools.

We are delighted that 40 new volunteers have indicated an interest in participating as mentors for the new school year from organisations including the Land Development Agency, Kennedy Wilson, Pinterest and Bord Bia.



Further Educational and Training Supports & Employment Opportunities

PTECH Progression

The first cohort of P-TECH students entered 6th year in September 2023 and work is underway to develop an education progression option for these students upon graduation. Supported by the NEIC Initiative, D/FHERIS and D/E are working with representatives from CDETB, NCI, QQI, NEIC, PTECH Industry Partners and Schools Programme Manager to develop and deliver a stepped pathway for students to gain a Level 8 Digital and Business Skills degree with exit awards available for those who do not pursue the full four years. Ongoing engagement with industry partners will ensure that graduate skills and employer needs are aligned. This is a vital next step to build on the success of the PTECH project in the NEIC.

Common Threads Research Findings and **Recommendations from NEIC Masters Fellowship Programme**

The North East Inner City Initiative welcomed the opportunity to work with the primary schools in the area and with DCU in support of the innovative NEIC Masters Fellowship Programme.

The bespoke Masters in Education (Special Option Poverty and Social Inclusion in Education) was created to develop teachers' understanding of educational disadvantage, to the benefit of their students, and to support staff retention in the area. Earlier this year, we published 'Common Threads' outlining the recommendations from this research. 

Childcare CPD Bursary

In 2023, the NEIC continued its funding for a Childcare CPD Bursary to support existing childcare workers in community childcare projects located in the NEIC, who have minimum level 6 qualifications to progress to level 7 (Higher Diploma) or level 8 (Honours Degree) in Early Childhood Education. During the 2022/2023 academic year the funds provided by the NEIC enabled 8 Childcare workers in Community Childcare Projects continue their studies.

Adult and Community Education Provision Strategy

In November 2022, an Adult and Community Education Provision Strategy, funded by the NEIC Initiative and the City of Dublin Education and Training Board, was published. Work continues to implement the strategy in the NEIC including developing a brochure of education providers in NEIC, and collaboration on new voter education and active citizenship programme for adult learners via the SOLAS ALL Collaboration Fund. The Strategy can be found on the NEIC website at www.neic.ie/publications.





Career LEAP

Career LEAP, now in its sixth year, is designed to support young people who face additional and significant barriers to entering the workforce. To date, 177 young people in the North East Inner City have successfully completed the programme of which 85% are in full time employment or full time education.

The NEIC Initiative supported the initiative again in 2023 with the aim of reaching

30 young people aged 18-25 years who are unemployed and in the hard to reach category;

parents, partners, family members and friends; and

up to 40 mentors from local businesses.

Social Enterprise Fund

The Social Enterprise Fund, funded by the NEIC Initiative, continued to support 55 posts to enhance local services in the area of childcare, youth projects, eldercare, arts and the environment. The Programme Implementation Board is working to put the funding of these posts on a sustainable footing and work on this will continue over the coming year.



Supporting Families and Young People

Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) for 0-5 year olds

Research and science points to the need to intervene at the earliest possible period in a child's development in order to have the best outcomes in terms of wellbeing, behaviour, emotional and physical self-regulation; all aspects of communication including language, motor, cognitive academic learning, social skills/friendships, self-esteem and mental health.

Building on the success of the MDT which operates in the ten local primary schools, the NEIC Initiative provided funding earlier this year to develop an MDT model of social and health service provision for children and their parents, from pregnancy to age 5. The MDT will collaborate with existing service providers in the area and provide support that is not available elsewhere within the community.

This new team will result in a seamless service for all children from the antenatal period to 12 years, in the NEIC with a focus on prevention and early intervention. Parents/carers and Early Years providers will receive support by way of trainings, coaching and advice, increasing their capacity to support the children in their care.

Afterschool Services

In 2023, the NEIC Initiative continued to provide funding to Ballybough Afterschool Service and to Belvedere Youth Club (BYC) to ensure that children 7-9 years of age had a safe and fun space to go

Additional funding was provided to BYC to enable them to expand their services and facilitate over 200 children in afterschool activities.









Funding was also provided to St. Vincent's Infants Boys School to assist with set-up costs to enable them to engage a childcare provider to establish a new afterschool service based in the school. This service will provide for children during both afterschool hours and school holidays.

The NEIC Parenting Coordinator works to support parents and coordinate services for parents in the North East Inner City. Imelda does this across four key areas.

Increasing Awareness: Developing an NEIC Programmes & Supports calendar, and promoting these programmes and supports directly to parents, as well as through NEIC networks and the NEIC website.



Improving Access: Linking parents with services who provide supports and deliver programmes, and acting as a central link for services and schools looking for information on available supports for parents.

Inclusive: Developing an NEIC Parent Forum which provides a space for parents to discuss their experiences, and ensuring service delivery is welcoming, relevant and accessible to all parents across all age groups.

Needs Led and Evidence Informed: Working together with other services to identify gaps in service provision, develop new responses and the delivering programmes such as Triple P - Positive Parenting Programme.

Throughout 2022/23, Imelda undertook an extensive body of work to build on this engagement.

NEIC parenting courses were held with 192 parents in attendance.

parents were referred to a service, course or to other support services.

engaged across 24 tabletop discussions

meetings took place for the **Parenting** Forum

professionals from 62 organisations were engaged in the Parent Strategy Meetings to explore how can we use existing resources effectively to support parents.

A website page and calendar were also developed to promote programmes and support services for parents in the NEIC. This can be accessed through the Parenting Coordinator Section of the NEIC website.

Inter-Cultural Lullaby Programme

An Inter-Cultural Lullaby Programme ran in Hill Street Family Resource Centre from November 2022 to January 2023 as a pilot programme. Eighteen families with children aged between 0-2½ years old were enrolled in programme. The programme supported a diverse and multicultural environment with Brazilian, Chinese, Irish, Italian, Polish, Mexican, Japanese, Turkish and Algerian families all being represented.







HAY Youth Diversion Project

The HAY Youth Diversion Project launched their Technology Hub and their Youth Space in February of this year. The Technology Hub features state-of-the-art equipment including photography, 3D printing, music technology, video making, coding, electronics, and animation.













Restorative Practice

The NEIC Initiative has funded Restorative Practice as part of its work to create a brighter future for everyone living in the area. Having the skills to build positive relationships, have restorative conversations and manage conflict is important for everyone, so the North East Inner City can be a safe, welcoming and happy place for its very diverse population.



In 2022/23, 210 professionals, educators and other stakeholders attended Restorative Practices training, workshops and events both online and in-person.

A further 144 young people (aged 9-20 years) participated in restorativefocused activities facilitated in-person, through primary and secondary schools, youth services, corporate organisations and National College of Ireland.



Throughout 2023, the Early Learning Initiative in NCI Restorative Practice Strategy to establish Ireland's first restorative community in the NEIC. The NEIC Restorative Practice Strategy 2024-27 which aims to sustain progress to date and embed restorative practices within organisations, homes, and communities across the NEIC is due to be launched in December 2023.

Inclusion Health & Drug Misuse

The NEIC Initiative is working to develop services that are evidence-based and sustainable in the long-term. The involvement of people with lived experience is a core principle of the initiatives being supported. The following initiatives were progressed in 2023.



Citizens Assembly on Drug Use

In October, Iim Gavin, Independent Chair of the NEIC Programme Implementation Board, gave a presentation to the Citizens' Assembly on Drug Use, during which he highlighted the impact of drugs in the North East Inner City and the health-led approach being supported by the NEIC Initiative.

The presentation gave an insight into the work and services being carried out in the area to meet the health and social needs of people who use drugs, including the Inclusion Health Hub, case management for people with high drug dependency, an Employment Access Programme for people in recovery, and an assertive onstreet outreach to vulnerable groups.

Establishing a Recovery Community in the NEIC

Funded by the NEIC Initiative, in June 2023 a conference & action planning event was held in association with Trinity College Dublin to explore the establishment of a recovery community in the NEIC. This event, brought together over 40 participants, including international experts, individuals who use drugs, those in recovery, service providers, policymakers and other key stakeholders.

The day focused on exploring what does and doesn't work, the current research, and what changes the community would like to see in addiction recovery services. The report produced from the event represents the collective wisdom of the North Inner City community, and their voices will continue to shape the future of addiction recovery services in the region.





Access to community-based services for refugees & migrants

Funding was provided by the NEIC Initiative for a grant scheme to support community-based groups to meet the needs, and to improve access to their services for refugees and migrants. Following a funding call in April, once-off funding was provided to eleven community-based services.

It is hoped to establish a greater take-up of services by refugees and migrants, alongside the development of a culturally appropriate service provision. These supports will enhance the integration of refugees and migrants within the community and potentially identify unmet needs to create greater awareness for service providers and policy makers.

Older People Who Use Drugs

The NEIC Initiative is working on developing a scoping exercise, including peer-led focus groups, to determine the needs of older people who use drugs. Older people with drug problems are defined as people aged 40 or over. By the age of 40, these people have had a long history of drug use which has had significant impact on their general health and well-being. A large proportion also experience mental health and social problems such as isolation, loneliness, homelessness, ageism, and stigma. Very often they live alone or in unstable accommodation and have little or no family support.

Healthy Communities Project

The Healthy Communities Project continues to be implemented in the NEIC by the Dublin City Community Co-op. The project aims to tackle health inequalities in the NEIC by building the capacity of the community to address health issues affecting them. It runs several community health programmes throughout the year, which continue to garner participation and positive feedback within the community.

The transition from prison to the community is a period of high risk for offenders as they can experience discrimination and stigma and struggle to engage with community health services. The Healthcare Navigation Service was established to provide support and guidance before and after release

from prison, in all aspects of health and social care.

The NEIC Initiative has provided funding to extend the Service for a second year. Strong links and starting to be recognised as an asset to the community and people it serves. In June, the service received a very positive visit from the new Director General of the Irish Prison Service. The value of the service to individuals upon release from prison was strongly recognised and assured support.

Domestic, Sexual and Gender Based Violence

Domestic, Sexual and Gender Based Violence (DSGBV) is a whole community issue and requires a whole community approach to respond to it. Funding approved by the NEIC Initiative has enabled a project lead to be engaged to drive the community response to Domestic, Sexual and Gender Based Violence in the NEIC.

Melissa Agnew, recently appointed to the position, will be based in SONAS in the North Inner City. Melissa will assess community needs and readiness to respond to DSGBV in the NEIC and ensure that services are connected and accessible to those requiring them. She will also work with the national HSE DSGBV health co-ordinator to implement and report on progress on the relevant actions under the national strategy, thus linking up the local and national dimensions.



Dual Diagnosis - Community Capacity Building Project

The Community Capacity Building Project is working to enhance services and strengthen collaboration for Dual Diagnosis (mental health and substance use issues) in the North East Inner City. Under the project, progress has been made across the several areas including open community dialogue forums, a community engagement session to co-create an integrated community care

pathway, trauma informed community workshops, dual diagnosis enhancement skills workshops, the formation of an integrated pathway tool, and the development of an interactive map of services. The Interactive Map can be accessed on the NEIC website at www.neic.ie/dual-diagnosis.

Substance Abuse Service Specific to Youth (SASSY)


SASSY is a HSE community service which provides support to young people under 18 years of age, residing in Dublin north city and county for whom drug use or alcohol use is having a significant negative impact on their daily lives.

Funding was provided in Budget 2024 to establish SASSY as a hub for an adolescent dual diagnosis programme. This new service will be of great benefit for the north inner city and wider north city and county.



Drug Related Intimidation & Violence Engagement (DRIVE)

DRIVE is a national interagency response to drug-related intimidation and associated violence. Through funding from the NEIC Initiative, a DRIVE Lead (Jack Sheeran) has been recruited for the North Inner City and will be hosted by the Local Community Safety Partnership. The NEIC DRIVE project will be connected with the national structure and will be supported by the national coordinator to ensure sharing of learning and adherence to the model.



Arts, Culture & Events

In 2023, the NEIC Community Arts Programme worked with a broad range of stakeholders across many different age ranges and contexts. The programme demonstrating to many strands of the community, the benefits that long term meaningful arts participation can bring to partakers.


In advance of the development of an NEIC Strategic Plan for 2024 – 2027, the NEIC Community Arts Programme has this year consolidated the work that it delivered in 2022.



Working with Local Community Housing

The St. Mary's Mansions Summer Programme 'Magic in the Mansions' took place in July and August of this year. The Artists created a mystery for participating local children by calling to their doors each week and playing with the children on their doorstep. As members of the Creature Features Detective Agency, they invited the children to help them solve the mystery of the strange creatures that had been spotted around the Mary's Mansions.

Each week, as the children designed and developed their creatures, their stories grew and soon we had fifteen very strange mysteries to solve created by twenty-five very clever storytellers aged between four and twelve.



In Autumn 2023, the Community Arts Programme is working with Focus Ireland to deliver a second Community Arts Programme to residents in direct provision accommodation.



Continued Professional Development (CPD)

As a pillar of its work, the NEIC Community Arts Programme supports workers in the NEIC to deliver meaningful arts programmes to children and young people. All artists engaged by the programme are highly experienced and committed in supporting the professional development of both teachers and workers. CPD sessions in 2023 took place with Holy Child Pre-School Rutland Street, Scoil Chaoimhín, Hill Street Family Resource Centre, Ozanam House, St. Louises Pre-School, ASESP.



Early Years

Visual Arts Residency

Feedback to the NEIC pilot Early Years Arts Programme in 2022, resulted in developing an opportunity for one pre-school in the NEIC to participate in a 12 Month Visual Arts residency that would be supported by the Hugh Lane Gallery and would provide opportunities for ECEs to learn from a highly specialised artist, in addition to experiencing and accessing a local Cultural Institution.

Following an application process, Ozanam House was selected as the setting that would participate in the residency. Over the 12 months, the residency outcomes are being tracked by an Early Years Specialist. To learn more and see the children in action, check out our video on www.neic.ie/videos.









Early Years Cultural Partnerships

- A three-month Early Years Music Residency with St. Louise's pre-school in partnership with the National Concert Hall.
- » A storytelling programme of work with St. Brigid's pre-school in partnership with Fighting Words.
- First steps A storytelling programme delivered to two local pre-schools in partnership with The Gate Theatre.
- Seasons and Stories a drama and storytelling programme exploring the seasons and focusing on the 9 developmental schema. This will be delivered to two settings.
- The Lullaby Project An Intercultural music and storytelling programme for parents and toddlers with Hill Street FRC.

NEIC Pilot Arts Residencies

For Arts engagement to make a difference it needs to be meaningful, consistent, and long term. This is why our Community Arts Programme is developing its long-term Residency Programme in partnership with local groups and artists. Below is the list of our 2023 residencies:

- Continuation of a visual residency with the same boys from Laurence O'Toole's CBS, now in 5th class.
- Continuation of a weekly residency with boys in the ASD classes of Laurence O'Toole's CBS.
- A three-month residency with Scoil Chaoimhín.
- The continuation of an Early Years Music Programme in Holy Child Rutland St.

Creativity with Older People

In the Spring of 2023, a programme delivered for older people in Ozanam House culminated in a performance on the 19th of June. The group are continuing to work together and will be presenting a performance this December.

Our pilot Visual Arts Programme for older women in Ballybough began in February, working with twenty-two women to explore their creativity via the medium of clay. The group facilitator explained "the ladies in our group had a great time. They loved the pottery and turned out many beautiful items."

Try It Out Programme

The Try It Out Programme is a short-term programme for clubs and schools and was delivered throughout April, May, and June 2023. Groups were offered the opportunity to participate in a range of creative programmes with the NEIC Community Arts Programme, the Hugh Lane Gallery and the Gate Theatre. Thirty different community and school groups have availed of the programme this year exploring Music, Performance, Drama and Storytelling and the Visual Arts.









Culture and Events

Lunar New Year

The annual Lunar New Year celebration, supported by the NEIC initiative, was held in January in the Hill Street Family Resource Centre. This is an important celebration of the rich diversity of people who reside in the North East Inner City.



Hill Street FRC Intercultural Family Fun Day

On the 29th of June, Hill Street Family Resource Centre celebrated its annual Intercultural Family Fun Day. The day was packed full of fun with games, a magician, performances, music, a puppet show and face painting. This annual event focuses on honouring the culturally diverse and supportive community within the NEIC.













Culture Night

The North East Inner City had plenty to offer for Culture Night on the 25th of September.



The Big Scream Festival

The NEIC Initiative was delighted to support the Halloween Big Scream Festival for 2023, delivering tricks (and plenty of treats!) to all in the NEIC. SwellFest


The NEIC Initiative were delighted to support SwellFest, the free sports and wellness festival which took place in Mountjoy Square on the 9th of September. This day-long event was all about celebrating sports and wellness in our community and visitors had the opportunity to enjoy a variety of activities, such as football, rugby, gymnastics, yoga.



Handball

Handball was a focal point within the NEIC throughout 2023. In close collaboration with Dublin GAA Handball and the National Handball Centre, the NEIC Sports and Wellbeing team have worked to introduce handball to schools and outreach resource centres in the area. A summer programme held in Ozanam House for children aged between 7-12 was enjoyed by all and later developments saw the construction of a new handball wall in the community resource centre.

A social handball programme for beginners commenced in June, providing participants with the opportunity to engage with Dublin GAA Handball coaches and to further develop their skills and techniques in the game. The success of handball in the NEIC culminated in International Handball Champion Eoin Kennedy's attendance at SwellFest.



Basketball

2023 was a hugely successful first year for basketball club the NEIC Trojans. The Trojans have become an immense source of pride for the children on the teams, and due to increased popularity and demand, the club has expanded to two boys and two girls teams in the most recent season. In addition to the academy that boasts over 100 participants in regular attendance, the NEIC Trojans also hosted two hugely successful summer camps in 2023.

Running

The NEIC has seen a considerable increase in the popularity of running and we were delighted to offer programmes throughout 2023 to support this heightened interest. The NEIC supported H.O.P.E. (Hands On Peer Education) Recovery Runners who regularly held running groups throughout the year. The success of these running groups was encapsulated by over one hundred community members, as well as many members of An Garda Síochana, who were in attendance for the H.O.P.E. Recovery Run held in September.

Additionally, weekly running sessions by local athlete Ruth Barry have been a great success during the year. Join the lunchtime 'Run with Ruth' sessions which take place every Wednesday from Seán McDermott Street.





Cycling

The NEIC Sports and Wellbeing team have been working to develop a cycling club for the community and worked closely with the Department of Transport and Road Safety Authority in order to facilitate the implementation of the Cycle Right programme in schools within the area.

The NEIC Initiative also partnered with Ballybough Youth Services to encourage young men to partake in a charity cycle to raise funds for mental health. This cycle was a great success and raised funds for a deeply important cause. The newly formed Inner City Cycling club has progressed to setting up their very own cycling route and has taking ownership of their weekly cycles.

Boxing

Boxing in the NEIC was as popular as ever in 2023, with local heroes such as Emmet Brennan and Kellie Harrington inspiring the community. The NEIC Initiative was able to offer support to the Box Cup held in St Laurence O'Toole centre in April. Over 170 fighters were in attendance, with some travelling long distances to partake, and the NEIC was well represented on the day by Saint Saviours, Corinthians, Smithfield and Docklands. The NEIC also offered their support to local boxing legend Emmet Brennan for his new boxing adventure FightR Gym.



Kellie Harrington Fun Day

The NEIC Initiative supported the Kellie Harrington Fun Day held on the 29th of July in Aldborough Place. This event gave community members the opportunity to meet and train with the Olympic Champion and local hero. Kellie's unwavering commitment to her local community was clearly illustrated by the great success of the day. The event was well attended with over 500 people present to enjoy boxing lessons, clowns, balloon makers, and the glorious sunshine.













Communidade Programme

The Communidade Programme was launched in partnership with Five Lamps Arts Festival in October 2023. Communidade (meaning Community in Portuguese) enables children from the NEIC to engage with new cultures and highlights the vital role that intercultural activities and sport play in shaping the minds of young children in primary schools. These initiatives offer numerous benefits that extend far beyond the classroom by celebrating diversity and encouraging physical activity. Throughout this programme students will be offered the opportunity to participate in gymnastics, capoeira, dancing and jiu jitsu.

Little Fitness

The Little Fitness programme is a social enterprise available for children and families living in emergency accommodation, family hubs, or in places where the possibility of facing barriers within the community may be more prevalent. 60 children were engaged from one Emergency Accommodation venue over 6 weeks, as well as 20 children from multiple emergency accommodations for a summer camp. This programme promotes fitness in children through the use of various themes, skills, and games each week. Children are encouraged to forge confidence through peer interactions as well as garnering health benefits through exercise.

SARI Football for Unity Festival

The third annual Football for Unity festival hosted by Sports Against Racism Ireland (SARI) was held in the NEIC in June. The purpose of this festival is to showcase the potential to utilise football as an educational tool which can bring communities together and promote social inclusion. The matches took place across a number of NEIC venues and was rounded off by the finals held in the St Laurence O'Toole Centre. It was uplifting to see the community come together through this year's festival and a true testament to the diversity of cultures that the NEIC represents.







Walking Football

Walking Football has made a sizeable impact on the community throughout 2023, with some participants aged in their 70s. This addition to the lineup of NEIC activities has enjoyed great success and wholly encompasses the idea that sport can be gratifying no matter your experience, age, or gender.

FAI (Football Association Ireland)

The D1 Football Academy is a collaboration with the NEIC, FAI, and DCC to provide a fun alternative to team-based football. The Academy, which takes place in O'Connell's school on Saturday mornings, aims to support the child's development and build their confidence in playing sport, making friends and learning new skills.

In May, the Docklands Business Network and the FAI held the second Dockland 5-a side Football Tournament. This tournament enhances community relations by facilitating the participation of local businesses and community groups in a fun day of football.

Sheriff Youth Club partnered with the FAI to re-establish the Late Night Leagues in September and to help at-risk youths through the reinforcement of divergent behaviour.

GAA (Gaelic Athletic Association)

In 2023, the NEIC worked closely with Scoil Uí Chonaill and the GAA to ensure that every young person was afforded the chance to try Gaelic football, hurling, camogie, and women's football. The NEIC School Blitz was held again this year, and hundreds of pupils from schools in the area competed on the Scoil Uí Chonaill GAA club grounds. The NEIC Scoil Uí Chonaill Nursery also continued in 2023, with children from the age of 3 obtaining the opportunity to play Gaelic Football and hurling for the first time.







Change for Life Programme

The Change for Life Summer Programme promoted fitness and wellbeing amongst adults through the organisation of 20 different activities, including boxing, yoga, walking football, aikido, weightlifting, and HIIT (High Intensity Interval Training) classes. There was significant participation throughout the community, with 220 unique participants engaging with the 20 classes offered over the course of 8 weeks. All classes held across the NEIC were available at a subsidised cost or completely free.

Sail Training

The fourth NEIC Sail Training Project took place over the summer with twenty-six members of the NEIC community taking part in two week-long voyages where they had the opportunity to become part of the working crew of a tall ship. An award ceremony was held in St Agatha's Hall on the 14th of August where participants were presented with Sail Training Ireland certificates in front of their friends and family.



ExWell Medical

ExWell Medical has continued to be a great asset to the local community throughout 2023. ExWell classes are targeted at those living with long-term or chronic illness and aims to assist in their rehabilitation through medically supervised exercise. 115 people attended classes throughout the year the community who may benefit from the classes.







NEIC Yoga Programme

The NEIC Yoga Teacher Training Programme, now in its second year, saw 20 new fully certified yoga teachers from the local area. Course participants set out on an 11-month journey, working to develop their knowledge of yoga and hone their skills. This course has garnered huge interest both in a community and national capacity and was featured in RTÉ's Nationwide on the 9th of October.

Yoga has become increasingly popular within the NEIC with schools, club, and residents all reaping the physical and mental benefits. Additionally, Chair Yoga was offered to residents in the NEIC from March. Throughout 2023, numerous classes were held in various school and community groups as well as in Sheriff Street, Ballybough and Sean McDermott Street.



Greening our Community

The NEIC Greening Strategy, adopted in 2018, has been changing the visual landscape of the North East Inner City. Areas that were once covered with concrete are now full of trees and buzzing with wildlife among the flowers.

Along with the redevelopment of both Diamond Park and James Joyce Park as outlined in the Capital Investment section of this Report, below you will find some of the other projects progress in 2023 to continue this investment in the community.

Royal Canal Greenway

Tree planting on the Royal Canal Greenway is ongoing as part of the overall Greening Strategy, using a mixture of native and non-native trees.

Street Tree Greening

During 2022, the public and public representatives highlighted a series of streets that were void of any greening infrastructure - Emmet Street, Belvedere Avenue and Portland Square, Portland Street North, Russell Street, Summer Street. Throughout 2023, works were undertaken to assess the possibility of greening works on these streets and conceptual drawings prepared. Following a public consultation process these designs were finalised and made available through November for further public consideration.

Subject to approval from all stakeholders, works are envisioned to begin in 2024.

Community Project (Ballybough Pride of Place)

A meeting was held with the representatives of the Ballybough Pride of Place community group, to review the current area and possible greening interventions. A series of projects were highlighted that include the following:

- Replacing fencing around the Sackville Place Biodiversity Garden with a more transparent ornamental railing
- The installation of trees along Summer Street.
- The removal of railings along the front of the boxing club
- The depaying of a large footpath and the installation of green infrastructure.
- The adopt a Tree Programme







Green walls

As well as improving the visual character of an area, Green walls provide numerous environmental services such as improving air quality and environmental health for the local community, while also absorbing carbon from the atmosphere. Large walls in a busy city environment amplify noise - green walls can help mitigate this noise as the plants absorb, diffract, and reflect noise, improving the acoustics in their area. Continuing from the successful green wall installation on Seville Place and on St. Joseph's Terrace, two more Green Walls were installed this year Common Street and Liberty Park.

Royal Canal Linear Park - Fitness Trail

A tender process is underway for the construction of a fitness trail along the banks of the new Royal Canal Linear Park, North Dock. The works will involve the removal of paved areas adjacent to the Royal Canal Greenway and the supply, installation & testing of proposed pieces of equipment, including the installation of safety surfacing.

Liberty Park Calisthenics

The Liberty Park calisthenics and accessibility improvement works is seeking to install a multifunctional callisthenics unit including associated site works in Liberty Park. The works involve the altering of an existing boundary wall and railing with the installation of a pedestrian gate, the extension of the footpath network and the supply and installation of a callisthenics unit.


Five-year review

The NEIC Greening Strategy has been in operation now for approximately 5 years. As a milestone year it was a good opportunity to review all projects completed to date and ensure all are preforming to the highest level. Following the inspection and assessment it was decided that remedial works were required in a number of areas due to anti-social behaviour and environmental conditions.


Responsible Dog Ownership Campaign

A pilot campaign for Responsible Dog Ownership was launched in April with the goal of addressing the issues presented by dog fouling in the area. Cleaning up after your pet means cleaner, safer streets for everyone. The campaign by Dublin City Council saw the installation of 50 new bag dispensers installed around the NEIC as well as a doggy toilet in situ on Sean McDermott Street.



DCC and Green Ribbon

Dublin City Council's Waste Management Team and the Green Ribbon crew have been busy on the ground throughout the year cleaning up our streets.



NEIC Funding 2016-2023

Since 2016, the Government has provided over €45.7 million in funding to ensure that the North East Inner City Programme Implementation Board have the necessary resources to fulfil the actions in the Mulvey Report and the Strategic Action Plan 2019 – 2023.

The following summary table sets out the sources and amounts of funding which have been provided by the Government for the NEIC initiative from 2016-2023.

Strategic Review 15

In 2016, Kieran Mulvey was appointed by Government to capture the challenges facing the communities of the North East Inner City and to recommended specific measures which would support the long-term economic and social regeneration of the area.

The Mulvey Report, published in February 2017, presented a clear vision for the NEIC's future, and outlined the drivers for change. It provided a set of recommendations to address the social and economic challenges in the area and led to the establishment of the NEIC Programme Implementation Board to drive the implementation of these recommendations.

In 2019, the NEIC Programme Implementation Board developed a three-year Strategic Plan 2020 - 2022 giving a more structured approach to the programme of work. Due to the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic, the Strategic plan was extended to end 2023.

Work has commenced on developing a new strategic plan which will re-focus strategic priorities for the next three years, and build on the ambitions of the Mulvey Report and the Strategic Plan 2020-2023. This involves conducting a strategic review of the NEIC Initiative in order to

- review progress to date,
- build on the structures put in place,
- examine pathways for mainstreaming successful pilot initiatives, and
- inform future planning to identify and address existing, new, and emerging needs and challenges in the area.

As part of the process, a programme of engagement will be undertaken in the new year to ensure that the residents and the community sector of the North East Inner City are given the opportunity to contribute their views on the key areas that the next Strategic Plan should focus on, from their perspective.


